Lollipop Moments...This is Why

As healthcare providers, we are challenged every day. Our units are short staffed, and the pregnant people are literally lining up to be admitted. It seems the patients present with a host of medical challenges and difficulties in their personal lives. It is easy as providers to feel overwhelmed and burned out. I'd like to share a story that reminded me of why I have continued to work in obstetrics for more than 25 years. I made an impact on a family. I don't feel that I did anything spectacular, but they remember me and how I made them feel safe and reassured. I did not realize that I have been a part of their story for years. For me, it was another night at work. Like many other nights, it was busy, my feet hurt, and as one of my mentors would say, "my ponytail was draggin'!" Oh, did I mention I was 38 weeks pregnant? In all honesty, I do not specifically remember our interactions, but after talking with Mya* some memories have emerged.

Mya and I met at my son's baseball tournament. We talked about our families and discovered that our babies were born around the same time. She asked if I worked at in labor and delivery where she birthed. Yes, I did. Mya exclaimed, "I remember you!" She described how I admitted her to triage one Saturday morning shortly before change of shift. Her husband made a comment about how I would be delivering soon too. I waved it off saying I had a couple more weeks to go (I had things to finish before that baby arrived). The next evening, I was not Mya's nurse, but when she was in the operating room, I was there to help. I went to her while she sat for her spinal, "all garbed up" in her words and asked her if she remembered me from the morning. She did. At the ballgame she recalled for me how comforted she felt that I took the time to go to her and hold her hand while she awaited the birth.

At the ball games the next day, Mya and I talked about telling our families of our experience together. She mentioned that her family declared, "Wait, don't tell us, it was the pregnant nurse!" My mind is blown that she and her family have remembered and talked about the time we shared. I am extremely privileged to be a part of their story!

This as a reminder that sometimes it can be the smallest acts that make a huge impact for our patients. Initially, I did not remember Mya and had to ask her name. She also did not remember my name. Yet, she remembered my actions. Helping a patient feel safe and comforted while she is going through whatever the situation is, may be the simplest of things we can do as care providers, but for the patient and the family it may be the thing that makes the experience exceptional. We are a part of their birth stories, and we have the opportunity to make those stories great.

Drew Dudley coined these interactions where we unknowingly make an important impact on another "lollipop moments." Mr. Dudley encourages us to value the impact we can have on others. His video [TEDxToronto - Drew Dudley "Leading with Lollipops" - Bing video](#) describes why we should strive to create lollipop moments. As healthcare professionals we have the opportunity to make a difference in someone's life every day. Chances are we won't know that it has happened and that's ok, yet to offer a kind word or thoughtful gesture may be just the thing to positively affect our patients' and their family's experience.

Managing the Pediatric Gentamicin Shortage

We've heard from a couple Iowa birthing hospitals recently that they are experiencing a shortage of pediatric Gentamicin. When the pediatric concentration of Gentamicin (20 mg/2 ml) is not available, NICU clinical pharmacists at UI Stead Family Children's Hospital recommend the following guidelines for management during the shortage: 1) Use a multi-dose Gentamicin 40 mg/ml vial to prepare pediatric doses. 2) You do not have to dilute the 40 mg/ml solution—this is the same concentration used for IM administration. 3) It is safe to administer this concentration through a peripheral IV in newborns, delivered on an infusion pump over 30 minutes. 4) Gentamicin, regardless of the concentration, is considered an extravasant. 5) **OF NOTE: Gentamicin 40 mg/ml concentration contains the preservative Methylparaben in the amount of 1.8 mg/ml. The maximum safe dose of Methylparaben for neonates is 10 mg/Kg/day. There is an increased risk of hyperbilirubinemia if you give more than the maximum dose of Methylparaben. We recommend double checking the amount of Methylparaben each dose of Gentamicin provides. 6) Consider the use of Cefotaxime/Ceftazidime/ Cefepime for patients weighing <1 Kg to limit exposure to Methylparaben.



Updates from Iowa Neonatal Quality Collaborative (INQC)

Twenty-three Iowa birthing hospitals are currently engaged in the collaborative. Hospital teams continue to collect data for the **NAS QI project** and a leadership team is beginning work on the **Late Preterm QI**. On May 5, 2022, the INQC Board of Directors voted unanimously to merge with IMQCC to form the Iowa Perinatal Quality Collaborative (IPQC). On June 3, 2022, IDPH submitted Iowa's application for a CDC grant to support the development of statewide perinatal quality collaboratives. CDC will award 22 states \$275,000 annually for 5 years. The grant is supported by the National Network of Perinatal Quality Collaboratives (NNPQC) with the purpose of 1) rapidly improving perinatal healthcare & outcomes statewide, 2) improving health equity—reducing disparities in healthcare & outcomes between subpopulations within a state, 3) building & strengthening the capacity of PQC's to improve the quality of perinatal care statewide with the development of multidisciplinary advisory committees, QI methods leaders, measurement strategies, data management & community involvement. If Iowa receives the grant, the majority of funding for the first couple years will go to the neonatal arm of Iowa's PQC for QI training. The Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) has two training programs for developing QI methods leaders: an Improvement Coaching Program (for individuals) and the Breakthrough Series (for hospital teams). The estimated award date of the CDC grant is Sept. 30, 2022...so stay tuned for more information on this exciting opportunity for Iowa!
